#### **Transport Survey**

An action item carried forward from the 2008 Village Plan, and recently highlighted as part of a review of this plan, is Village Transport. While there have been several consultations in recent years on the use of the bus, this survey seeks to understand more generally the transport needs in the Village. It is independent of any bus consultation and specific to the needs of Stoke St Gregory.

The survey is enclosed in this News Letter, and apart from the second question only requires that you tick or circle the appropriate boxes which are self-explanatory.

#### **Parish Council News - Allotments**

At the July Meeting of the Parish Council a revised proposal for allotments in the field behind Church Close was presented. This proposal sought to address the concerns raised by those directly affected by the original plan. The modified plan includes minimising the interface with Church Close and the inclusion of planted buffer zone and community orchard between Church Close and the actual allotment plots. Vehicle access from Slough lane is proposed although there will be footpath access at the South end of the area.

The PC voted unanimously to approve this proposal. Work has now commenced on fundraising from national organisations in order to start the groundwork necessary to enclose the area and to provide screening and planting for the area. It is anticipated that the area will be ready for the next growing season

PC News – Defibrillator Most people will be aware of the defibrillator outside the village shop, but not everyone will realise that it is intended to be useable in an emergency by anyone, even if you have no training. The machine gives clear audible instructions at every stage. If somebody's heart has stopped, speed is more important than the niceties of technique. On receiving a 999 call where a heart attack is suspected, the ambulance service will inform the caller if there is a public defibrillator nearby, and if this can be deployed before the ambulance arrives, that could increase the chances of survival. We are planning to arrange a demonstration at the Village Fête on 17 September to raise public confidence in the use of the defibrillator, and if there is any call for it we will organise a training day in the Village Hall as well.

### **Tractor Traffic**

Tractor traffic is an essential part of rural life, however the Parish Council has received an increasing number of comments and complaints from local residents concerning the conduct of some tractor traffic on Village roads. These comments generally fall into the category of excessive speed or use of mobile phones while driving; sometimes both.

The PC has agreed to approach the authorities directly to request more robust enforcement of traffic regulations, but there is also the opportunity for individuals to register specific complaints online. The link to this form is:

The more specific the information the greater the chance of resolving the issue so at the very least the reg. no. of the vehicle, along with the time, place and the infraction perceived should be noted.

#### Parish Council News (continued)

[June-August 2016]

Two long-term issues were finally agreed at the July PC meeting: the revised proposal for allotments in the field behind Church Close (described in more detail on page one of this issue) and the go-ahead for the TDBC parking scheme at Polkesfield. This latter is not as extensive as we had hoped, but should nevertheless ease the parking situation to an extent.

The results of the **Affordable Housing Survey** were also announced by TDBC Housing in June. There was only a 30% return, and interpretation of the results was complex, but the conclusion was that while 11 respondents expressed a desire for affordable housing, a breakdown of the details suggested that there was no significant need to increase the existing stock. The full text of the report is available to view, and will be posted online.

The new **website** has been in limbo for some weeks pending migration to a new software platform, but it is hoped that it will be ready for reloading content by the beginning of September. The idea is for individual organisations to be able to edit their own pages, and as soon as the structure is in place, page-owners will be contacted and given details of how to do this.

The **broadband** situation continues to be uncertain. It is still hoped that wireless broadband at 10 mbps will be available in the village for those without access to fibre, but CFB, who originally planned to establish a connection weeks ago, have encountered snags finding a site for a way-station, and are now in the process of teaming up with another supplier. In the meantime it could be in everybody's interests (with or without access to BT fibre) to express an interest on the Gigaclear website (www.gigaclear.com). Gigaclear's network model is far more radical than BT's: they bring fibre to the home rather than just to the cabinet, so the distance to the cabinet problem which bedevils the existing fibre rollout is much less significant. There is a good chance that GC will bid for the Phase 2 contract that BT pulled out of, but in the meantime they are extending their network on a purely commercial basis, and have recently moved into pockets of the Blackdowns. They naturally prioritise areas according to the amount of interest demonstrated.

There has been a good deal of news recently about the controversial merger of Taunton Deane with the bankrupt district of West Somerset, which was agreed by TDBC at their full council meeting on 26 July. Many people feel that the reasons for this merger, put forward by the Conservatives who have control of the council, are disingenuous and misleading, and the PC agreed to write to the Council leader beforehand, urging delay pending further consultation. West Somerset have yet to agree, but since they have more to gain than Taunton Deane, it is unlikely that they will look a gift horse in the mouth.

A new website, www.travelsomerset.co.uk, has been set up by Somerset County Council to give information on current and future road closures and bottlenecks.
