### PC Announcements email list

We are now operating the email list set up for occasional announcements such as road closures. ### Wireless Broadband

There has been a significant development in the last couple of weeks for those in this area with no access to fibre broadband: CFB Solutions of Crewkerne have decided to extend their wireless broadband network to cover all of Stoke, Burrowbridge and Lyng. This is not superfast and it is not fibre: those of us without fibre would remain second class citizens paying twice as much for a lesser service, but it is still a game-changer in relation to what is currently available, and a huge improvement on satellite which is the only other alternative. The catalyst for this has been the recently announced CDS voucher scheme: Connecting Devon & Somerset is offering vouchers to anyone with broadband speeds below 2mbps (or, I am told, close to that: record your speed on a bad day!) to pay for the *installation* of an alternative form of broadband. The only alternative immediately available in this area is satellite, but that is a last resort which is not recommended.

Wireless broadband bounces the signal from a wireless source to various access points by line of sight across the land to a very small receiver on your roof. It does not suffer from significant lag. It is theoretically capable of fibre speeds. CFB is currently guaranteeing 10mbps, but they expect to increase this to 20mbps as the network matures (Superfast is 24mbps+). Prices would be £20/25 per month, with data caps of 30/60 gigabytes respectively. (Ongoing subscriptions would not be covered by the voucher scheme.)

It is hoped that trial installations will be set up in Stoke and Lyng within the next three weeks, and that CFB will then accept CDS vouchers with a view to completing other installations in the area within three months. For those with current speeds more than 2mbps but less than 10, wireless might still make sense, but they would have to pay their own one-off installation costs of around £150.

CFB is a homespun two-man outfit based in Combe St Nicholas, but they have been managing a successful wireless network along the south coast for several years and seem to know what they are doing. As an alternative to the corporate behemoth that is BT, I find the human scale of CFB rather refreshing. The contract period is only 12 months, so the stakes are in any case not too high. ### What's happening at The Willow Set

The Willow Set is continuing to do fantastic work for our children within our community, under the fantastic management of Rachel Parish and her wonderful team. The Pre-school has terrific facilities for 2-4 year olds. It helps many children to develop and thrive into happy, confident individuals, which ultimately is our goal as an early years setting.

This term they are preparing the rising 5's for the start of school in September, with fun activities at the Willows and Wetlands Centre (Forest School) with the current reception class at SSG School, visits to a local farm and learning through play, all geared at easing the children with the transition into school.

Our Sun up Sun down club (SUSD), which provides before and after school care is also continually expanding, with numbers increasing each term and on certain days is fully booked. This facility provides flexibility for busy working parents, which enables a good work life balance for a lot of our families and caters for children from 2 up to 14 years old. In 2015 we started a holiday club (Moor Fun Club), which initially opened for 3 days of each week of any school holidavs. We are now open every day of the holidays including half terms (except one week at Christmas and one week at Easter). It caters for children, within our community, age between 2 - 14 years old and enables them to enjoy a fun packed couple of hours or a full day involved in various activities such as sports, music, cooking, crafts, gardening, roller-skating, majorettes and much more. This wonderful interaction between small children and older children has worked incredibly well with very positive feedback from both parents and children. A true credit to how The Willow Set is managed. On some days we are fully booked and with some great activities booked in for the upcoming summer holidays, we hope this success will continue.

### Parish Council News March-May 2016

The Village Agent, Audrey Mansfield came along to the March meeting to give a presentation on her work in several local parishes. She can answer a variety of needs: helping people to receive benefits, directing them to helpful organisations and generally linking up people in difficulty with those who may be able to help them. The search for a solution to the shortage of parking spaces at Polkesfield continues. The original proposal to add eight spaces at the bottom of the hill turns out to be of modest benefit, since it would displace almost as many spaces as it would add. Several other suggestions have been put to the District Council by the PC and we await their response.

The redesign of the village website is proceeding. It is proving a longer job than we had hoped, but many thanks to Tom Fyfe and Graham Gleed for all the work so far. Once it is ready to roll, the address of the original site will automatically point to the new one.

In response to concerns about leaning gravestones in the first row of the Burial Ground, the monumental masons Manning & Knight have kindly relevelled the four which they had installed. Strictly speaking, grave owners are responsible for maintaining their own stones, and while this is not a safety issue, leaning stones are an unwelcome sight. It is however a simple matter to relevel them. The mason who installed a stone will give advice or may even do the work without charge.

The PC agreed to adopt updated regulations and fees for the Burial Ground. These will be available from the Parish Clerk. One thing that was clarified was the requirement to maintain a level surface once a grave has settled, a year or so after a burial. This considerably simplifies maintenance of the burial ground.

Every household in the village should have received a form to fill in for the housing needs survey conducted by the District Council. Jo Humble, the Housing Development & Enabling Manager came to our Annual Parish Meeting on 26 April to speak about the background to this survey. It is designed to establish the level of need for affordable and low-cost housing in the village, so as to inform future planning decisions. The PC is conscious of the fact that as more and more houses receive extensions, the average size of a house in Stoke St Gregory is gradually increasing, while small houses are in particularly high demand. The results of the survey are being collated, and should be being reported at the June PC meeting.

The chairmanship and vice-chairmanship of the PC, as well as the PC representation on the Village Hall Committee and Playing Fields Trustees remains unchanged following the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 9 May.
