Transport Survey

Thanks to all of you who took the time to fill in the Transport Survey distributed in the previous Stoke News. In all a total of forty four replies were received from a total distribution of four hundred and seventy five. The data therefore can only be taken as indicative, rather than the basis from which conclusions can be drawn.

One clear demand was the need for a transport connection to Langport. As support for this connection would not result in direct competition with the existing bus service, the Parish Council agreed to explore the possibility of developing this service as a community transport scheme. It is anticipated that this would be an on-demand service during the working day, charged at a nominal mileage rate to cover driver's costs plus any small overhead charges.

In order to develop this further I would request that the people (there were around twelve) who volunteered to be drivers in the event of such a scheme being developed contact me to discuss next possible steps. CHANGES TO MOBILE LIBRARY SERVICE

Due to continuing funding pressures, the county wide mobile library service is hanging by a thread. It is down from 12 vans a decade ago, to 1 van today, which luckily for us still calls at Stoke St Gregory once a month. There is one more visit this year on Thurs 29th Dec from 3.00 – 3.40pm in the Square. In 2017, the time will be changing to Wed from 2.55 to 3.25pm in the Square. The first visit next year is on 1st Feb. Please support this rural service if you can – the driver is very helpful and friendly and the selection of books is good.

Parish Council News: September-November 2016

For those in Curload, there is now a viable wireless **broadband** network, operated by Wireless Broadband Southwest, offering 10+Mbps, with a cap of 250 GB for £25/month. It is hoped that this will be also be available in Stathe very soon, with Meare Green and Huntham to follow as soon as possible. Vouchers from CDS for free installation for those with current speeds of 2mbps had to be applied for by the end of November, and any (free) installations need to be completed by the end of March. We must apologise for the continuing delays in implementing the new village website. This is a high priority for the PC, work remains active, and we will publish it as soon as we can.

A constitution for the **Allotments** Association was agreed in September, and work on the legal underpinnings for the new allotments is now proceeding behind the scenes. We expect to see real progress in time for next year's growing season.

The two **telephone boxes** in the village may shortly be removed by BT. The scouts are keen to take over the one by the Playing Field, and if anyone has any bright ideas for the one in Woodhill, they should refer to Graham Gleed. It is understood that if the village acquires them, they have to be used in place.

More Parish Council News (Sep-Nov 16)

Ann Finn is getting closer to getting a **Speed Watch group** off the ground in Meare Green. If anyone would like to join in, to help monitor speeds there or in other parts of the village, they would be welcome. The PC has also bought a number of **wheelie bin stickers** to discourage speeding. If anyone on a 30mph-limited road would like to display one of these on their bin, they should contact Becky, the parish clerk. See details elsewhere in this issue of a proposed volunteer drivers scheme to help people with transport problems.

As an alternative, to keep the kindness local, we would invite you to contribute to the **Reeve's Feast**, administered by Heather Venn and Barbara Carpenter. As many people may not be aware, the Reeve's Feast is at least 700 years old. Its early days are obscure, but it originated as an institution for feeding those in need, then degenerated in the 19th century into an excuse for a communal blow-out. It later returned to its roots as a small scale local charity for identifying need and providing help. (It used to cover North Curry and Stoke St Gregory, but the Stoke version is now separate.) Cheques to either Barbara or Heather, especially at this time of year, would be very welcome.

Finally, the North Curry Health Centre is looking for volunteers to join their **Patient Participation Group**, which provides feedback and helps to shape strategy. Details can be found at

The PPG is particularly looking for more representation among younger people and men. The next meeting is on 18th January.

Duties include taking bookings over the phone and by email, showing prospective hirers over the hall and its facilities, and sharing in the opening up and locking up duties. This does not need to be a role invested in a single person in fact several volunteers working to a mutually acceptable rota is in many ways a preferable solution.
