going to need it!!

The last three months have been relatively quiet regarding new **Planning Applications**, with relatively few new applications, none of which have caused any particular controversy. However, the resubmission of the four applications to build a single large agricultural structure on the ridge above Lower Huntham Lane provoked an animated debate. Strongly stated representations against the applications were received from the public prior to the formal opening of the December meeting. Having studied the supporting documentation, the PC took the view that this information was both inconsistent and in some cases contradictory. Pending clarification, the PC offered no comment. It was felt that these four applications for a single contiguous building should be presented as a single application.

The major theme running through the last several meetings has been how to release funding for school improvements. Although the PC has no executive authority in this process it is clear that the residents of the Parish are concerned and as such the PC is motivated to try and help resolve the situation. The challenge is at multiple levels. While the discussion initiated around the provision of places for children of residents in the new Willey Road development, it also served to highlight some of the fundamental issue that challenge the day to day functioning of the school. In reality it is the highest priority to resolve these issues first. The school dates from the Victorian era and, while it is a cherished institution in the village, its fabric and structure are challenged by 21st century demands. The PC is working with the school governors and the local authorities to try and reach a satisfactory outcome. The issue is further complicated by the nonavailability of CIL money paid by the developer of the new houses in Willey Road. Apart from a small proportion that will be allocated directly back to the PC this money is being paid into a central fund from which recovery seems impossible. The struggle continues.

PC expenditure over the past year was reviewed in December. Spending has been in line with budget when exceptional items are separated. The precept for the past two years has remained unchanged. However due to the considerable uncertainty going forward it was agreed that a small increase to £16,000 was justified for the year 2020.

As part of the effort to maintain a shop and at least one Pub in the village the PC agreed to support the 'Shop in a Box' as the interim arrangement pending success of the HOTV project. Agreement was reached for its delivery and installation at the Williams Hall. The Village Stores which closed its doors for the last time on the 31st December 2019, successfully relocated to its new premises and opened for business as usual on Jan 6th 2020 (for more details see the HOTV report).

Climate change and the role of the PC was also a strand which wove its way through several topics, at the February meeting. At the Annual Parish meeting on May 4th, the Guest Speaker will be Steve Mews of Somerset Wildlife Trust, Steve also spoke at the AGM of what is now Climate Action Athelney. It was agreed by the PC that we should engage further with this group. SWTC has also started a consultation on Climate Emergency. The consultation document on-line is well worth individual input and can be found on the village website https://www.stokestgregory.org/climate-emergency-plans/

Do you like the outdoor life? Are you a regular user of the **footpaths** that criss-cross the village? Then there is an opportunity for you. Following many years of service Cecil Boobyer is standing down as Footpaths Officer. The PC would like to thank Cecil for his work over the years in this important but unsung role. If you or anyone you know would be interested in taking this on, please contact the Parish Clerk, Kelly de Silva Finally, the PC would like to pass on its thanks to Paul Morse and the Organising Committee of the **Stoke Stampede.** This event is extremely highly regarded is the running community and is recognised for its first-class organisation and welcoming support. It is an event that really puts Stoke St Gregory on the map.

HOTV February Update

Firstly thank-you to all who have invested both for the first time and also to those who have contributed in addition to their original contribution. The total invested continues to increase with some 220 individuals contributing around £190,000. We still need the final push to close the gap to £200,000, but confidence is high that we will achieve our target. Crossing this threshold will release funding of £220,000 in the form of £103,000 in grants and £117,000 in loans. Further sources of funding are being actively worked. On this basis it is anticipated that an offer will be made for the Royal Oak in the coming weeks.

In the meantime, the interim solution of a Shop In A Box (SIAB) located at the Williams Hall has been a fantastic success. While having a smaller footprint, there has been virtually no compromise on the range of goods sold. So far, some 50 people have volunteered to help in the shop prior to it becoming a community run venture at the end of March. Training is progressing well thanks to the dedication, energy and enthusiasm of Ian, Karen and Marilyn. If you have an interest in volunteering, we would be very glad to hear from you. All who have participated so far have commented positively on the experience. One thing that has become increasingly apparent is the need for a part-time manager at the shop. While most of the day to day tasks can be managed by volunteers there is a need for an overarching responsibility which provides a strategic view. We are optimistic that this role can be in place by the end of March.

To finish it is worth emphasising that the next four weeks will be critical. Firstly, to cross our Community Contribution threshold, then to enter into the purchase of the Royal Oak, while at the same time continuing to develop our pool of talent with a view to transitioning to a community run shop at the end of March. Exciting times for the village.

Local History: More about Quaker Roots

With reference to the article printed in the winter issue of the newsletter, a reader has suggested that for anyone interested in finding out more about Stoke St Gregory's Quaker history to visit the Somerset Record Society and consult

Local History - What's in a Name?

The original name for what is now Willey Road was Wells Hay Lane. The field where the new houses are being built was Wells Hay, which extended from Slough Lane to the rear of the Royal Oak. Opposite was Upper Wells Hay, from half way up Griggs Hill, up to and including the playing field.

Hay field with wells in it? No. Hay is the Anglo Saxon for hedge or enclosure (from where we get the names Haywarden and Howard - someone who looks after the hedges) and Wells refers to the Lords of the Manor - the Dean and Chapter of Wells Cathedral. Before King Henry gave the manor to Wells this would have probably been part of his personal demesne, as opposed to the land that was farmed by the various tenants. 'Wells Hay' - a good name for the new estate?

Stoke St Gregory Women's Institute

2020 began well for us with two local speakers giving equally lively, interesting talks. In January, Adrian Holt told us all about the Arts and Crafts movement, his particular area of expertise and interest. With his experience of antiques as an auctioneer, a dealer and restorer, alongside his wife, Amelia, it was a very lively meeting. We were shown beautiful examples of the Arts and Crafts movement and Adrian answered many questions. It was heartening to hear of Adrian's success again in February at the Williams Hall talking about his life in antiques and discussed items brought in.

In February Lu Lloyd spoke to us about the glass artwork which she makes and sells at her shop at the Willows and Wetlands. She described how she made stained/ leaded glass, fusion glass and kiln- melted glass, then demonstrated the creation of a lovely example using a combination of lead strips, nails, hand- cut glass and soldering. Making it look easy, we realised though that years of experiment and practice were needed to reach her standard. Lu had brought along a range of her work for us to see and possibly buy. Two very enjoyable evenings!

View from 'The Box'

On 6 January we opened The Village Stores at its new, temporary, home in the 'Shop in a Box'. Having taken a little time off at Christmas and New Year, the move was made with minimal disruption. However, it was only possible with the efforts of a small team of willing volunteers. Karen and I would like to publicly thank those who took the challenge to move refrigerators and miscellaneous equipment from The Square to the Shop in a Box in Dark Lane.

The willingness of volunteers to take on new challenges was always going to be the theme from January 2020 onwards. Our task now is to guide and train a small army of volunteers to the point where they have the skills, competencies and confidence to run our community shop from 1 April 2020. This is no mean feat and we must all pay credit to those among our community who have signed up as shop volunteers. We currently have about 50 volunteers on the books but we need more – about 60-70 in total. So I would ask everyone to think about coming on board and making a difference to this community. There are many benefits to volunteering, but if you are in any doubt, speak to one of our current team. I would particularly appeal to younger people to consider volunteering – just a few hours here and there will result in a significant contribution to the vibrancy of our community. Now that we are settled in 'The Box', I'd like to reiterate the fact that we sell the same range of foods, newspapers, beers and wines, tobacco, household goods, stamps, confectionery, fresh dairy, fruit & veg, bakery, etc. that we sold in our previous location. Whilst we are smaller in physical size, nothing else has changed and we would really like you to continue using your village shop.

We are now six weeks away from the first day of our community shop and there is much to do – much of it 'behind the scenes'. It is a very busy time as the Heart of the Village project team approach a critical point in our vision for the future. As I write this, we are within sight of our £200,000 target – an unbelievable achievement in such a short space of time. There were those who said it could never be done – they are about to be proved wrong. We are relentlessly moving forward and it is important that our community works and benefits together both for our own wellbeing and for those who will follow us. Three cheers for Stoke St Gregory!
