Parish Council Report

In the November PC meeting there were two **planning applications** to consider. The first of these for a wooden garage at Reed's Barn, Meare Green was supported, however the second for an extension and carport at Brae Barn, Curload was more problematic. While the PC does not normally stand in the way of individual property development, errors in the application around the property line would have created access and parking issues. As a result, the PC felt it could not support this application.

Thanks to the comprehensive proposals submitted by Kelly De Silva, we were successful in receiving £1500 from the SALC (Somerset Association of Local Councils). This money will be redistributed among the Scouts, the Environment Group, The Tennis Club and the Baptist Church. Ironically a request for funds for the Church Room was declined due to archaic legislation that prevents the PC contributing to Church assets. We have also been successful for a further phase 2 application which requested £5000 for the Willowset.

The **Budget precept** was agreed and submitted. A 10% increase was proposed which closely matches the increase in the number of households in the village as a consequence of Broomfield Park. Any individual household should therefore see minimal change in the contribution paid to the Parish. It was also decided not to fund the young people's initiative through the precept, but to seek grant funding for this. PC reserves will also be impacted by funding the 30mph zone in Meare Green which could cost between eight and ten thousand pounds.

It was agreed to proceed with the **young people's initiative**, and to engage with The Community Youth Project to design and plan a first meeting to which young people will be invited so that their needs can be better defined. It is anticipated that this will take place early in the New Year

Following the PC meeting and after over a year of inactivity SCC highways have started work on the project detail for the **30mph zone in Meare Green**. The project now appears to be moving forward with some momentum. The next step will be to understand the costings and approve the expenditure.

At the end of September, we had the opportunity to participate in a conference that introduced the project to move to a **single (unitary) authority,** replacing the current district and county councils. While this is superficially a simple concept the transition is a complex activity with high levels of uncertainty, particularly for a small parish like ours. There may be considerable benefit to be realised, but how this will be achieved against the aggressive timeline envisaged will be subject to clarification over the coming months.

An urgent need has been expressed to replace the **broken bench** at the bus stop at Polkesfield. There will be a site inspection this month. If this does not result in progress, the PC will move ahead to purchase a bench as a Parish asset

I hope it has not escaped your notice, but the **Phone Box** at the playing field has at long last been refurbished and painted. Thanks are due to Trevor Hooper who volunteered to undertake this work and a fine job it is! We are happy to receive any suggestions as to how you think this space can be best used.

Finally, for those of you who walk the **paths and byways** of Stoke St Gregory, with or without a dog, I am sure you would wish to join the thanks to the footpaths team in the Environment Group who have been steadily cutting back overgrowth at styles and gates. A small but very noticeable improvement.

The Queens Jubilee

Next year Her Majesty the Queen will celebrate her Platinum Jubilee marking 70 years on the throne. The Village would like to commemorate this extraordinary event in an appropriate way. 
Results of Community Survey on Allocation of CIL Funds.

The results of the survey have been reviewed and collated and were presented at the PC meeting this month. It is true to say that we are disappointed that only around 25% of households responded to the survey. For an issue which has generated considerable discussion, it can only be interpreted that it does not figure in people's priorities given all the other current challenges. However, we do believe we have sufficient data to draw valid conclusions.

In analysing the results, we only counted contributions that were positive indications of support, rather than neutral or negative comments. We also removed comments that are covered by existing budgets. The outcome of the survey which is as follows.

The conclusions that can be drawn from this data are as follows

- In the category Health and Fitness there was strong support for the provision of a multi-use games area at the Playing Field which can be used by all age groups
- In the Environment category, a strong desire was expressed to identify (and purchase) a plot of land that could be converted into a 'wild space' for community enjoyment
- The provision of better gates and stiles on footpaths also received significant support.
- While no decisions have been taken on spending, it was agreed that we will start to explore possible options for the first two of these listed.

Stoke St Gregory History: Crooked Drove

If you walk the public footpath from Hook Bridge, round the back of Turkey, along Crooked Drove, and across the railway to Baltmoor Wall, you will be following the main channel of the original River Tone. The river then meandered across Salt Moor, turning right at West Yeo. It joined the Parrett near Manor Farm. If you walk back down Cuts road to Athelney Bridge you will be following a smaller channel of the Tone, which then curved round below Athelney Hill and joined the Parrett near the present confluence. Between your start and finish points is a stretch dug and embanked in 1374-5 to lessen the flooding on the land of the Abbot of Athelney. When Baltmoor Wall was added, Saltmoor (part of the Athelney Estate) was even more protected from flooding, but the owners of land on Stanmoor (then Stathe Moor) were not happy, as their property was much more liable to be flooded. Not only was all the water coming down from Taunton and the hills beyond now very near their property. The Tone was also entering the Parrett at a place where it was already not deep or wide enough to cope with the volume of water arriving from its own headwaters. Pam had lived in the village almost continuously from a very early age following her parents move from Drayton. Pamela attended the village school and went on to become a maths teacher at Bishop Fox's school. Pamela is probably better known for running the Post office and shop at the top of Griggs Hill until it closed in 2011. Widely known for her love of animals and in particular, cats as well as gardening, Pamela was also extremely well versed in history and classical art and until two years ago still travelled widely in Europe seeking out specific works of interest. Stoke St Gregory will be poorer for the loss of a character widely known in the community.

PRIDE OF SOMERSET

The **Stoke Saint Gregory** Community Group, known fondly as the Heart of The Village, HOTV, are the proud winners of the Somerset Medal 2021.

Stoke St Gregory, with a <u>population of only 942</u> is celebrating a positive village success story, worthy of that award. Our village was in danger of losing its remaining Shop and Pub just before the pandemic started.

As a result, concerned residents set up a community company, **HOTV** Stoke St Gregory ltd, to pump life back into the heart of the village. The <u>Heart of the Village</u> project aim was to buy the Royal Oak, transfer the shop into it and run both shop and pub. A <u>unique</u> feature of this particular enterprise is combining the shop and pub into a community hub alongside a Cafe.

The coronavirus pandemic has fostered "a greater sense of connection", spurring villagers to volunteer to help others in the community. Faced with this adversity, we could have become more divided and looked for others to blame.

This crisis has brought out the best of community spirit. We saw it in the daily acts of kindness playing out across the village, whether that's delivering food parcels or phone calls to those who are lonely and isolated at home.

The resilience and ability of Stoke St Gregory's residents to adapt and mobilise will shape positive outcomes for the Village Community now and in the future. The presence of our new hub @The Royal Oak, provides a positive local impact, by ensuring the provision of a community space and a variety of services that would otherwise be lacking in the area, including a visiting Post Office service.

Our Pub, Shop and Café, run by the community and for the community help bring people closer together. Importantly, they are a space for older, vulnerable and more isolated residents to access important local services and feel part of their community.

News from Stoke Environment Group

Thank you to everyone who came along and supported the very first Stoke Envirofair in October! All in all, we believe it was a great success and we received very positive feedback from both visitors and exhibitors. In case you missed it, we welcomed a wide range of groups and organisations including the Somerset Wildlife Trust, RSPB, Somerset Waste Partnership, Coates English Willow, the School, Somerset Beekeepers, Somerset Wildlands, Dykes Farm, the Parish and Baptist churches, and Willow Set. We are now planning the next fair which we hope will be held in June 2022. We want this to be as inclusive as possible and we would like to invite all groups to attend and demonstrate their environmental credentials! Contact us for more information.

Stoke St Gregory Parish is now officially 'on the map'. "Well, of course it is" I hear you say – but this map is to be used to assess the 'Somerset State of Nature', which is being managed by the Somerset Environmental Records Centre and Somerset Wildlife Trust. We are the first parish, outside Taunton, to be included in the project and the prospect of making a valuable contribution is very exciting. More details to follow, but in brief, it is based on citizen science – and that's where we all individually come in. By using a free phone app, we will be able to record sightings of nature and upload them so that community resources can be used to provide targeted help to the environment where it is most needed. We are just finalising the process and SEG hopes to launch this initiative very soon. Look out for more information on our Facebook page: Stoke Environment Group.

Our work on footpath clearing and mapping continues – I am sure you have noticed the difference! We are now identifying signage and making improvements. We live in fantastic countryside and the best way to experience it is to walk it. Easy-to-use guides are being produced to help us navigate our way around.

We are currently awaiting our new hedge whips for the village hall boundary, and we hope to organise a family hedge planting day so that everyone can contribute to this ground-breaking project! There will be a few trees being planted too – we hope this will be the start of something bigger.

Well done to the Brownies who, during half-term, learned all about one of our favourite native species – Mr Hedgehog! With the expert guidance from George who works for Secret World, the young environmentalists got to know this prickly friend, where they live, what they eat and they then made some hedgehog homes. If you look very closely, you may see some Hedgehog Hotels around the village!

Now that the COP conference has finished, there will be much for governments to consider in the fight against climate change. SEG was formed as a result of the need for our community, amongst others, to take on the challenge. Our efforts may be considered small on a global scale, but every tree planted will make a difference, every use of a footpath rather than a car journey will make a difference, every purchase of a local product will reduce carbon emissions. SEG hopes to encourage all of us to re-think our actions — if we do nothing, even on a small scale, we will be responsible for the severe consequences that our children and grandchildren will unquestionably inherit.

The Solar PV panels now have been installed on both sides of the roof above the function room. They were switched on Thursday evening October 25th. It is a joy to see the meter, given the present cost of electricity, whirring round, even when it is raining. Thanks go to Somerset County Council Climate Emergency Social Fund for the grant that permitted this improvement.

Finally, as the world holds its breath, work is progressing towards starting our food offering later this month (November). Plans are well in hand. What we wish to avoid is a prejudicial reaction due to trying to do too much too quickly, thereby compromising customers' perceptions. It will be a low key start but plans are well in hand to ramp this up as experience and demand evolve.
