#### Parish Council Report

We are pleased to welcome our new Parish Clerk, Sally Taylor and three new Parish Councillors: David Cuthbertson, Lawrence Bostock and John Derby.

At our last meeting on November 13th Councillor David Fothergill issued a Somerset Council brief which predicts an end of year overspend of £27.3 million. The financial position for 2024/5; there is an expected budget gap of £100 million which represents 20% of the total budget. It is likely the Council will be served a section 114 notice in February. This notice prevents all new spending with the exception of protecting vulnerable people and statutory services and pre-existing spending commitments.

They will still be delivering core road maintenance throughout the county including Somerset Gritters which are ready to be mobilised once the temperature drops below zero this winter. Recycling will not be affected but there will be changes to collection days in February 2024.

Our bus service could be at risk. Please join the campaign to save it. Use the service or we lose it.

The Parish Council are about to set the precept for next year and need to prepare for the worst case scenario.

#### Communication

The PC are in the process of replacing the Parish Noticeboard on the corner of Church Close.

We are launching a quarterly surgery, the first to be held at the HOTV café on Saturday 15th December from 10am until 12 noon to give people an opportunity to raise any issues. The surgery times and venues will be printed in the Stoke Newsletter every quarter.

#### **Defibrillators**

We are currently in the process of introducing two new defibrillators in the village to allow better access for all. One will be sited in Curload and the other in Meare Green.

#### Damage to the Coppice at the village Hall

Hugh Griffiths the Managing Director of RSK Hi Line Ltd has issued an apology to the community of Stoke St Gregory for: "the confusion around the planning of the works and the understandable frustration and disappointment the works caused across your community."

Compensatory payments of £1000 were made to SEG and £1,000 to the Village Hall Trust.

They have promised to make good the damage.

#### The Mummers

Our multi-award-winning Community Hub/Pub, The Royal Oak, in the heart of the village of Stoke St Gregory, is delighted to host the North Curry Mummers on Boxing Day, 26th December. Mumming is best described as early pantomime. The plays are based loosely on the legend of St George and the dragon and intended to show the struggle between good and evil. This unmissable free event, (although there will be a collection

for our Hub project), is the ultimate feel-good entertainment after a strenuous Christmas as it is both heartwarming and hilarious. Our Shop and Café will also be open for snacks and warm drinks.

Come and see how we go above and beyond in building a better Community in our Village.

#### Project Play Update

We've been working extremely hard over the last few months getting everything in place to apply for the funding we need.

Here is an update:

Confirmation from Somerset Council that the NuMUGA facility does not require planning permission.

A proposed new path to link the entrance to the playing field with the new facility has been agreed by the Playing Fields Committee.

Fantastic feedback from children of all ages on the 'star sticker boards', which enabled them to tell us which pieces of play equipment they would like to see.

We now have the final design, which is 480sqm, includes 17 pieces of equipment, cycle stands, seating and planting. Costs have been updated to reflect the use of different materials, reducing the overall cost without compromising on quality or durability.

Sparks Somerset (who provide funding support) have commended the work that has been done to date, particularly the Community Plan and the ongoing engagement we have with the children. Funding applications are now being prepared and will be supported by a Project Play funding document, which has been reviewed and approved by Sparks Somerset.

The result of all of this hard work will be a truly bespoke play facility that has been designed and inspired by the young people of our community. Please keep an eye out for images of the final design at the Royal Oak Community Hub and the Playing Fields.

#### New Community Hub Group

As agreed at the Annual Members' Meeting of HOTV, and further endorsed at the first meeting of the new Management Committee, the Community Hub Group met for the first time on 6<sup>th</sup> November, with 22 people attending and others sending in comments and suggestions. The group brings together all those involved in the Community Hub Project - Staff, Volunteers, and most importantly those who use the shop, café & pub, and who provide the money to guarantee the continued existence of the project. It should be noted that the new group is completely separate from, but will liaise with, HOTV Management.

The subjects discussed at the very positive first meeting included: Various ways of establishing the future aims of the overall project and the individual elements - shop, café & pub; Cleaning; Volunteering; Communication; Phase 3 of the building programme; Customer Retention; Car Parking; and other more specific topics concerning shop, café and pub.

A member of the group will attend the next HOTV committee meeting and the resulting comments and decisions will be reported (we're working on how to do that - 'Feedback' has to be the key word for this new group).

#### **Playing Field Committee Celebrate Grant Success**

The playing field committee are delighted to have been awarded a grant to install a youth shelter on the Playing Field. In discussions with some of the young people who use our playing field it became obvious that they really need somewhere safe they can hang out with their friends. Working with them, the PFMC applied to the Valencia Communities Fund for a grant and have been awarded £11,442.

Neil, Chair of the Playing Field Management Committee says 'we are thrilled to able to work with some of the young people who use our playing field to install the shelter to keep them dry and safe, working with them to agree to the final location and colours as well as them deciding on the rules and being responsible for ensuring that everyone sticks to them'.

The PFMC are hoping that the shelter will be a great asset for other groups including the Willowset, Friends of School, the Scouts, residents of the village and dog walkers. Somewhere dry for everyone to take a seat and rest their legs.

The plan is to start work early next year when the weather and field aren't so wet.

We are delighted to be able to announce that as well as securing a £16,000 grant from Valencia Waste Management to upgrade our kitchen equipment, we have been generously awarded £45,911 by Valencia Communities Fund to fund Phase 3 of the refurbishment of the Royal Oak.

Phase 3 was always part of the plan for the Royal Oak and will complete our accessibility programme, providing disabled access toilets and extending the eating area, making more sense of the layout of the building we have all inherited. We will be holding an open day at the Oak on Saturday 16 December to show the proposed plans to HOTV Members and customers, to discuss the options and to receive comments and suggestions.

The grant is dependent on the overall design as per the plan that VCF agreed to fund. Within this constraint we are open to feedback and possible minor adaptations, which is why we are holding the open day.

The pub and shop will both be open from 10 till 4. Copies of the plans will be available to consult and members of the

Management Committee available to talk through any issues and answer questions. We look forward to meeting you there to discuss the next phase in this heartening village success story. Christmas is fast approaching and we have already got a display of seasonal treats available in the shop. Both the shop and pub have a number of special events planned for the festive period. Our chef Jenna, as well as providing her usual excellent fare is planning a one-off spectacular culinary experience; she will be producing a fantastic multi course feast. #### Blacksmiths of Stoke by Dave Evans

By the beginning of the last century, there were only two blacksmiths left in Stoke. Daniel North, originally from Beercrocombe, was in Meare Green, near Huntham Lane. Frank Bird's forge was opposite the Baptist Chapel. The Bird family also went on to run the post office there, in the house now known as 'Normans'. Griggs Hill itself was named after a previous blacksmith. William Grigg, of Isle Abbots, married Charlotte Andrews in North Curry in 1836, and they lived next to the smithy in what was then just called 'The Lane'. Lot Watts headed another family of Stoke's Victorian blacksmiths. Born in Mark, he married Stoke girl, Jemima Cummins, in 1823. Lot owned the land, including the old Village Stores, around the corner to Huntham Lane, to what is now the rear entrance to Jessamine. In 1832, Lot's house suffered a devastating fire, caused by a spark from the chimney of his forge next door. The Taunton Courier reported on the incident on 13th June and gave a warning to all rural blacksmiths: "It is hoped that this will be a caution to country blacksmiths who, for the most part, have thatched houses adjoining their smiths' shops, and which, in dry weather, so very much endanger not only their own houses and property, but those of their neighbours. The expense of substituting tiles would be a mere trifle when compared with the damage to which they are daily and hourly exposed by the use of thatch."

I want to use this article as a way of thanking you for the ongoing support many members of your community have given the school and to give you an update on some changes.

Firstly, a sincere 'thank you' for all of the community engagement in support of the school.

A sincere thank you also to the Revd. Simon Bale and Revd. Sonya Setchell and the communities of St Gregory Church and Stoke St Gregory Baptist Church for their support and commitment to the school.

Very soon the primary school will become an academy and part of a wider community of schools called The Oak Partnership multi-academy trust (MAT).

The Trust is a family of schools that cater for children and young people from 2 – 19 years old which was established on 1st January 2019. This will mean that the school is no longer maintained by Somerset Council.

The Trust have been supporting our primary school for a year now on a consultancy basis so we are delighted that the support and collaboration is now on the verge of being formalised.

The staff at Stoke have been trusting, enthusiastic and committed to making a large number of changes to the school in the last year and it is now with great pride that we see the school thriving and continuing to develop and grow.

#### St Gregory's Church

Do you ever give a thought to the beautiful, ancient building we have in the heart of our village? I'm sure we can all remember times of joy or sadness when the church has featured significantly. It has stood there, rock-solid, grey and steadfast for everybody, over almost a thousand years of our village's history. Sadly, we cannot assume that it will be there for the next millennium. This will not be the case without some significant help from all those who have used it in the past and hope to do so in the future.

One wall of the Lady Chapel has suffered severely following the erection by our Victorian predecessors of two heavy stone memorials. These have now been removed, exposing areas of collapsed stonework requiring expert repair. The churchyard paths have long been a subject of discussion and head-scratching and will need serious investments to make safe. With our latest five-yearly architect's inspection other developing problems have come to light.

This glorious building is not there just for the vicar and a few worshippers to gather on a Sunday but for ALL OF YOU, ALL THE TIME. The regular worshippers would be sad to see it fall into disrepair, but we can worship anywhere; would you seriously like to see it abandoned and derelict? Just where in your own village would you or your family like to be married,

baptised or buried?

If you have never set foot inside St Gregory's then please come in and take a look around – we're open every day during daylight hours.
